#### **GLRA leads ILEP in India**

GLRA now leading the ILEP India (International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations) from the 1st April 2023. By leading ILEP, our role is to coordinate the consortium of 9 International organizations (AIFO, ALM, DFIT, FAREMED, FONTILES, LEPRA, NLR, TLMI) working for the cause of Leprosy in India besides work with various stakeholders, Central leprosy Division (CLD), central and state governments, WHO Global Leprosy Programme, APAL (Association of People Affected by Leprosy) and others, to make India leprosy-free and improve the well-being of affected individuals and their families. Dr. Srilekha Penna has assumed the role of ILEP India Coordinator and Mr. Ashish Dangar as Deputy ILEP Coordinator.

GLRA India in association with Spark India Lucknow empowers youth with disabilities through skill development; 9 candidates trained, 3 secure jobs

GLRA India, collaborated with Spark India to organize a skill development program aimed at empowering persons with disabilities. The program enrolled 16 candidates, out of which 9 successfully participated in the program, which included training in English speaking, technical skills, and post-program employment support. Eligible candidates were provided with free accommodation, meals, and a stipend of 1500 rupees. Following the completion of the training, three individuals secured placements, while the rest are undergoing training for future placement. The primary objective of the program was to enhance professional growth and employment opportunities for persons with disabilities.

Patients and their families received self-care kits for practicing self-care at home. The initiative aims to empower communities and reduce the burden of morbidity due to diseases.
